The Two Ministers

The year started with Revd John Nyota as our minister, as he had been since September 2003 and he had planned to be through to August 2008. However, after much heart searching, John felt called to expand his ministry with a change of direction into politics. Being Kenyan and with the Kenyan elections looming in November 2008, John's passion for his home country led him to stand in the elections. He did not expect to win but he saw it as a foot-hold and a training ground towards fulfilling his ambition of serving God and his country from within the Kenyan political arena. We are grateful to John for all that he brought to Martin Way during his ministry with us.

John left Martin Way in February 2008 and Revd Barrie Tabraham, already the Circuit Superintendant and minister at Christ Church with St Philip, Worcester Park, stepped into the breach by taking on pastoral oversight of Martin Way. He admirably fulfilled this role until August 2008 when he took planned early retirement on health grounds. We, at Martin Way, are indebted to Barrie for the, albeit short, time he spent with us.

The New Minister - Revd Paul Timmis

We had started looking for a new minister to share with Worcester Park at the beginning of 2008, although the Circuit Stewards had started much earlier. It became evident after the first candidate was declined, that we would be very fortunate if another minister became available because of the shortage of ministers. Not having heard anything by the end of May, we therefore, in conjunction with the Circuit Staff, set about laying plans for being without a minister for at least 2008/9.

However, by the Grace of God, Revd Paul Timmis unexpectedly became available and after the usual interviews, visits, etc he was as happy to accept our invitation as we were to welcome him to the Circuit from September 2008. He is married to Rebecca and they have two young daughters, Amèlie and Matilda.

The Leadership Team

It was always John Nyota's aim to build a Leadership Team to represent the outlook of the congregation and members of Martin Way to the minister. The team would bring to their meetings the joys and concerns of the people who were Martin Way Church and advise and suggest ideas and plans to the Church Council. During the year 2007/8 the average number of monthly Sunday morning communicants was 55 compared with 63 in 2006/7 and a two year average (2006/8) of 59, indicating a downward trend of 13% during a difficult period for the church. Evening communion service attendance rose slightly from 11 to 12 with the valued support of ministers from the circuit over the two year period. Taking into account extra midweek and special communions, attendance at 851 was slightly down from the previous year. Those attending have been very positive concerning the variety of style and experience in services allowing time for personal reflection, especially in the quieter evening services.. The General Account

In the Methodist year to the 31st August 2008 money received from Sunday Collections, including payments made by Banker's Orders and cheques was £21,523.04, which is the first time in our history that we have achieved such a high figure. Well done everyone, but can we now improve on this to beat inflation?

There are then separate Gift Aid payments of £2,955.00, so that the tax returned from Gift Aided donors produced £5,816.45, which is marginally down on last year. I almost hesitate to repeat my much stated plea for those who pay income tax, who do not already Gift Aid their payments, to do so without delay. At present we only have 36 Gift Aid Declarations to the General Fund and 9 to the Building Fund, plus one single payment to the Building Fund of £1,000.00. In spite of the reduction in the standard rate of tax this April, we are still able - for three years - to continue to reclaim tax at the old rate of 28p in the £, so that a donation of, say, £5.00 per week is increased by £1.40 at no cost to the donor. This would equate to an extra £72.80 in a year! Why not ask me for more details as to how to do this?

This year has included some exceptional items of income, interest on funds with the Central Finance Board of the Methodist Church is paid six monthly, but last year the second payment was late in arriving so has had to be included in this year's income - an amount of £3,529.27. We had a Gift Day which produced £2,740.00, the Pantomime gave us £652.43 and the May Fair £1,160.20. So we have something to do in the current year to make up for these items!

The overall picture is encouraging in that taking our income - including that from the use of our premises - against our expenditure, leaves us with a balance in hand, but we have to work at keeping this position.

A word of thanks needs to be expressed to Pete Boyd who was "persuaded" to take on the role of Bookings Secretary after the death of Ted Ashwood. Ted served us well over a number of years, and Pete has continued the good work very successfully. We now have income from groups which is helping to replace that which we had for some years from the YMCA Afterschool Care and Merton Park Music Centre, before they had to give up. Thanks also to the various Church groups for their donations.

We continue to be grateful to the Late Derek Masters who died in January 2004, and left us a legacy in his Will of just under £180,000.00. This, with other generous donations and grants, has enabled us to carry out the three phases of the redevelopment of our premises so far undertaken to date, and leave us with a healthy capital sum in hand. Any further work to be undertaken will, however, create the necessity for further substantial fund raising!

The **Building Fund** which has had to deal with a number of items during the year, not the least of which was the theft of lead from a number of locations on the roofs which had cost £14,015.82 to put right. We have so far recovered £11,980.82 from the insurance company, and the Loss Adjuster has authorized a further refund of £1,935.00. This leaves a balance of £100.00 which is the excess on the policy which we have to bear. There has been other redecoration work, fence repairs, roof repairs, new carpeting, etc.

The **Benevolent Account** continues to make regular donations to deserving causes.

The **Flower Fund** where the carried forward balance continues to reduce, donations of money as well as flowers always welcome to this fund!

Our aim is to provide attractive, comfortable and functional surroundings in which to worship God and bring others to know Him. The premises have again proved their flexibility for a range of church activities and the work over recent years to upgrade and maintain the premises has this year shown fruit with an increase in non-church groups finding the premises to be an attractive venue for their activities. This is a welcome reaffirmation of the church's role within the local community and increases the potential for introducing others to God, as well as easing our financial plight.

The year has, however, been dominated by the repair work necessitated by the theft of lead from the roof. Initially thought to have been confined to the ramped corridor and vestibule area, the theft was subsequently found to have extended to the flat roofs above the hall. The theft resulted in significant water damage to ceilings and carpets. Much of the lead has now been replaced with durable roofing felt and the affected areas redecorated. The opportunity was taken to re-carpet the whole corridor, vestibule, Parlour and vestry, re-felt three flat roofs and undertake general roof maintenance.

During the year a fire risk assessment and security review were undertaken, Smartwater applied to items of value, and a safety check made of all polypropylene stacking chairs with those showing signs of structural weakness being replaced.

The church's aim for the future is to increase the visibility of its witness to God and plans are focused on building a coffee shop with direct access to the church and the main road. An architect has prepared several exciting options, one of which is to be pursued subject to a financial feasibility study. Recognising the likely timescale of the project, it has been agreed to explore an interim proposal for a café in the Coffee Lounge. This would use existing facilities; concentrate issues of Health & Safety and Environmental Health in existing locations; and minimise set-up costs.

7. Vision Matters

As this is our first Annual Report, we have taken the liberty of retracing our steps one year, i.e. to 2006/7. The Leadership Team at that time decided that our Vision Statement was due an overhaul as it had not been looked at since 2000. The result of many hours of prayerful deliberation resulted in a new logo and a three stage vision followed by a plan to put that vision into practice, "The Mission for the Vision".

It was also decided that committee meetings would not be held just because we have always done that in the past. This resulted in a more streamlined administrative and meeting system with more emphasis placed on the Church Council who, after all, are the governing body of our church. Although the Family and Mission committees were discontinued, the work they did was taken up by the Church Life and Mission representatives reporting to Church Council, which now meets quarterly.

A summary of our vision follows:

We, from Martin Way Methodist Church, are a community that encourages people to:

- WORSHIP** together to be more Christ-like (Worship);
- GROW** together in our Christian faith through Bible study and house fellowships (Pastoral);
- SERVE** our neighbours with our church facilities and the weekday activities (Church Life);
- SHARE** with each other and the local community the excitement of God's love (Mission).

Our worship year began with a Worship Consultation at the September Church Council. A lively discussion took place resulting in the conclusion that the pattern of worship that has evolved over recent years is generally accepted and welcomed as providing a variety of styles. So in any one month we have:

All Age Worship is a service at which the young people and adults share the whole service and worship. It is less formal than a traditional service and although it caters for all age groups, the material is such that it can be understood by the young folk. The music is led by our Church Band.

Morning worship is a traditional Methodist service led by the minister or a local preacher. The children move into the Sunday Club after the first part of the service.

Holy Communion is an essential part of our worship together. All those who profess a faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are welcome to receive the elements. At the morning communion service, the children stay in the Sunday Club from the start but join the congregation towards the end to receive the elements of bread and wine should they so wish. Evening communion is less formal and often takes place "in the round".

Praise Services offer a more informal approach to worship and cater for more modern and varied tastes with contributions through music, dance, drama, readings and song. They are participatory services with members of the congregation taking part. Again, the music is led by our Church Band.

Refreshments are available after every Sunday morning service so that we may get to know one another better.

Music is provided by our organist and/or Church Band and when they are not available, our trusty digital hymnal steps into the breach!

Technology also play a part in our worship with several radio mikes, the ability to project hymns, prayers, bible readings, liturgies and video as well as playing CDs and DVDs. However, we sometimes choose, where appropriate, to revert to hymn books, bibles and the Methodist Worship Book.

We are very adaptable, and are looking forward to our new minister, Revd Paul Timmis, adding Ionian elements to our worship, something which he is keen to do.

Worship is important to us and is at the centre of our being. To be able to offer our praise openly to God, among other Christians, is a privilege we should honour since in so many oppressed counties, it is a privilege many Christians are denied.

Over the past year a lot of restructuring with regard to the different committees and their functions in the church, has meant the mission event envisaged for 2007/08 was put on hold.

However I can report that as in the past the church was involved in the street collections and a sponsored walk for Christian Aid and the overall total amount raised by the church was £1,668.60.

Each Christmas we carol sing at Morden Station in aid of Action for Children (formerly the NCH) for which this year we raised £734.00. In addition to this our Christmas collections, Christmas Tree Festival and the SIGMA concert brought that total to £1,468.60. Add to that the £171.08 raised through the year via home collection boxes meant that we were able to send a grand total of £1,639.58 to Action for Children

It is my hope that during this coming year we will be able to carry out a mission event within the local community in addition to our own celebrations for 75 years of the church being established at Martin Way. In his inaugural address at the opening of the church in September 1934, the Revd Donald Soper spoke of the new Christian society to come and how Martin Way church could become a template for that future world. There is even more reason today as to why that should be true.

All Age Worship, Praise Service and more.

We provide the musical accompaniment for All Age Worship services on the first Sunday of each month and for the Praise Services on the third Sunday of each month. In addition, the one-off Café Worship style service, organised by Platform 10 ¾ one Sunday evening in June, is worthy of being considered for inclusion on next year's service plan.

We currently meet before the services that we are playing for and have a quick practice. We are, however, in the process of setting up additional rehearsals for perhaps one Sunday afternoon a month to learn new music that can be 'gradually' integrated into the services. Then the band can really give something extra.

Music is an important part of worship that can be joyous and uplifting or reflective and moving, helping us all to praise the Lord in different ways. Old traditional hymns and brand new songs all have their place. Having the band has given Martin Way more scope with these various styles of music.

Throughout the year we are called upon for one or two special events or shows such as accompanying the circuit youth choir, SIGMA, which is a highlight of the year. These events involve all or some of the band members depending on the sort of music required. The Praise Services tend to be more music based and can be quite lively, so the band looks forward to playing at these services too.

One difficulty we face is finding enough musicians in the church. We currently have only one piano/organ player, who is really quite stretched with other duties. We are also in need of another guitarist and our drummer, while very happy to come and will continue to do so, should really see a bit more of his own church in West Ewell. We have a small woodwind section and some singers, but would very happily welcome anyone else willing to play an instrument or sing. The other difficulty we are faced with is finding time to practice as a band other than Sunday mornings.

It is hoped that the band will continue to develop its role in worship by providing music that helps us all to draw closer to a relationship with God, and that would be good.

Meets Friday 6.00 - 7.30pm (Term time only)

The youth club is for 7 - 12 year olds, both boys and girls, and meets every Friday during term time. The aim is to provide a safe, semi-structured environment for both children from church families and those from the wider community to meet and socialise. At present we have 7 children from the church family and 27 from the wider community.

The club began as a result of the original stewardship campaign, following requests from children too young for the then Senior Club. It has been running for nearly 20 years. Over that time the leadership has changed but the aims and organisation have been consistent.

Each week there are social games to play e.g. table tennis, pool, computer games, table football, air hockey as well as larger games such as indoor hockey and outdoor stoolball (a traditional inter-village game). Each week there is either a craft or cooking activity led by the

leaders. We provide a drinks and sweets counter. This is generally run by ex-members who come back to help out as they can't bear to leave us!
