

On reflection, I decided that I was glad that this newspaper writes about the weather as frequently as it does - if only because it means that it is giving its readership a break from its incessant anti-immigration rhetoric. I also concluded that if we're convinced by the story that has been offered to us - and, in stark contrast to the newspaper articles, by the good news at the heart of it - we should be confident enough not only to tell it over and over again but to do so with an urgency that sometimes eludes us. So how about we try? We have a limitless number of opportunities to do so. We could start with Harvest, Advent, Christmas and then, next year, during Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter and Pentecost...

CSW AMBASSADOR DAY

It is always good to meet up and network with other CSW church representatives (now renamed Ambassadors) for an Ambassador Day held at St Luke's Community Centre, Central Road. This annual event was organised by Janet Wilkinson the Ambassador's Co-ordinator, this year on Saturday 24th September. The Ambassador's motto being: *Join us. Stand up. Speak out.*

Rev Joel Edwards, CSW's Strategic Advisor was our first speaker. He reminded us that millions of people are imprisoned and tortured for what they believe. Over 70% of the world's population experiences suffering because of their religious beliefs, not all of them Christians and in this shared humanity of sufferings, Christians are called to *do good to everyone* - especially those who 'belong to the family of believers' (Galatians 6:10). Since the Christian's mandate is the Bible, it is right to defend religious freedom. Other religions have rights too according to Article 18 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights:

"Everyone shall have the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion. This right shall include freedom to have or to adopt a religion of belief of his choice, and freedom, either individually or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion and belief in worship, observance, practice and teaching."

Wai Hnin Pwint Thon a Campaign Officer with Burma Campaign Uk and activist was the guest speaker. In 2010 she made an impassioned speech at the Labour Party conference and the Liberal Democratic annual conference about her father's detention and the plight of 2,200 other political prisoners held in Burma. Her presentation was equally emotional as she recalled meeting her father for the first time

imprisoned and in chains, their only means of communicating was through prison bars. Now that she lives in the UK, she has to get a visa whenever she visits her native country and is followed wherever she travels. Her father was released in 1996 but still continued campaigning for democracy in Burma. He was rearrested in 2007 and sentenced to 65.5 years. Following a break, Janet interviewed CSW's Middle East Advocacy Officer Dr Wael Alegi, a Doctor and Psychologist, also Spokesperson for Syrian Network for Human Rights. Dr Wael is a Christian brought up in Damascus and gave us a little of the history of the warring factions in that war torn country. He reiterated that it is the responsibility of the international community to step up efforts to bring an end to the conflict. Justice and Human rights should be core concepts for any political solution, otherwise the war will only accelerate - further destabilising he already unstable situation in the Middle East. Prayers for the situation in Syria were foremost in our hearts and uttered aloud during our times of interceding for the cries of the persecuted.

At the end of the sessions we heard about crimes against humanity in North Korea, especially to those who practice their faith in secret which included arbitrary imprisonment, torture, enforced disappearances, rape and sexual violence and other in humane acts too awful to mention. Currently there are 130,000 Rohingya and 120,000 Kachin who live in camps in Burma and being denied aid. According to the UN, 17,000 people have died in terrorist-related violence in Nigeria, and forced to flee their homes. Persecution is more common that we care to think.

As the church's CSW rep, I am challenged to raise awareness of the organisation's work, mobilise the church to become involved, encourage others to pray, to act and to give. 


