MINISTER'S LETTER

There are days when we want to do nothing else but lock the door and shut out the world, times when we can't face anyone or anything and every fibre of our being screams at us to stay at home, lock the doors, close the curtains and pull up the duvet.

It should come as no surprise to us then that, having witnessed Jesus' death, his disciples weren't really up for going out. They were grieving the loss of their leader and friend, who'd given their own lives purpose and meaning. If ever there was a right time for a duvet day, it was surely this one, but, in the eyes of the author of John's Gospel, that wasn't the main reason for staying in. No, "John" is certain, Jesus' friends stay inside after Jesus' death because they feared for their own lives. They were afraid that the religious leaders that had plotted and schemed and all but arranged Jesus' death would come for them next. Jesus' death had been a brutal execution and had come about because Jesus refused to stop talking about God's kingdom and doing things to show what that kingdom might look like. If his opponents wanted Jesus and his message eradicated - and it certainly looked like they were serious about this - it would make sense to wipe out his followers too, wouldn't it? No wonder they were afraid. No wonder they stayed in, behind locked doors

For those of us who are ever even a little bit fearful of what lies beyond our doors in this often dangerous and scary world of ours - and, given the state of things at the moment, it'd be understandable if that was just about every one of us - this is an important story to hear. For where all seems lost (including all hope) and life appears to be at its bleakest, Jesus appears in the midst of his friends - in the midst of their fears, anxieties and troubles - and brings a message of peace.

His friends didn't seek him out. They displayed no strength or courage. They took no risks. They didn't go anywhere or ask for anything - it doesn't appear that they even prayed (it isn't mentioned anyway, perhaps they weren't up to it). Through no course of action that they undertook, Jesus came to them where they were with a message they so needed to hear. No wonder his friends rejoiced.

However seemingly bleak a situation and whatever the cause of it, God can break in with a message of peace to ease troubled minds, to alleviate the despair and restore hope. That's good news!

It's important to remember this. When we see the bravado of world leaders take countries seemingly to the brink of war; when we see bombs falling on homes, schools and hospitals reducing buildings to rubble and killing thousands of people; when we see a suicide bomb destroy a convoy of civilian refugees fleeing a war zone; when we see terrorist attacks on city streets, some of them close to home; when we see far right parties in the ascendancy and/or worry about democracy being diluted here, it's important - vital even - to remember this good news.

But it's important - and just as vital - to remember too that Jesus didn't leave things there. More than once he offered a message of peace to his friends before saying, 'As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' 'In other words', Jesus is saying, 'the work doesn't end here. This isn't all about giving you hope, though that's important. You need to carry that hope for and to others.'

In the original ending to the Gospel of John, Jesus signs off by imparting the Holy Spirit to those friends - to empower and guide - and reminds them that forgiveness lies at the heart of who he is, who God is, and therefore at the heart of the work to which his followers are called.

The news that we are called to continue this work, that we are to be hope carriers and peace bringers, might be daunting, but the Easter story tells us that we're not on our own.

Alleluia, Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

And his Spirit is with us.

Merton Street Pastors

Gwen Wildman, Brenda Cannon and I attended a special meeting called by the Trustees of Merton Street Pastors. The meeting was call so that all the Merton Street Pastors [MSP] could hear and understand the financial state of the Charity.



It was explained that in order for the MSP to continue with the high standard of work for the Churches on the streets of Merton a minimum amount of money is required.

Our very good Coordinator John who has been working for MSP for over 10 years is having to reduce his time to just 3 days a week and this will impact on the overall work of MSP as he will have to change his approach and prioritise his work load.

I have always understood that it costs money to run any charity (Having been involved in setting up a charity working in Kenya), but I had not given any thought as to the amount required.

We were told that a minimum amount of money is needed per year of around £18,000 (John's wages, insurance for all the SP's, uniforms, training, rent of a very small room, etc.)

As you can see finding that amount of money is always going to be a problem but we believe that with the blessing of God for this work and by prayer of everyone in ALL the churches we can and will find the money.

Now I know that we are all asked for money by all sorts of worthy causes and I know that we only have a small amount of spare money, but I'm asking you to seriously think and pray about giving a regular amount each month to Merton Street Pastors so that God's work can continue on the streets of Merton. Brenda, Gwen or I would be very willing to give you further information.

Making Contact With Old Friends

For some years the church has been the recipient of an annual donation to the Flower Fund in memory of the late Gladys Nott. However, with the passage of time and the death of John Butland, Church Treasurer, we lost contact with the donors, DO and FJL Nott, and did not know their address or relationship to Gladys. Recently, with the help of the bank, we once again made contact and I have been able to extend the thanks of the church for this longstanding and ongoing donation.

The donor is David Nott, Gladys's son, and his wife Françoise who now live in Lancashire. In reply to my letter David writes:

"Many thanks indeed for taking the trouble to write to me in connection with my donation to the church. It is good to know that the donation is still helping to fund the church's ministry of flowers.

I have looked at the pictures on your church website, and the oval layout of the chairs is indeed very appropriate - welcoming and inclusive.

My mother Gladys was always one for flowers, and it is the best memorial she could have. She also loved music, and enjoyed dressing up for her part in the local Light Operatic Society's shows. After she was widowed in 1970, the warmth and fellowship of the church community meant a lot to her, and helped to sustain her in her life alone.

I was brought up just opposite the church, at I Buckleigh Ave, where we occupied just the ground floor, but had the use of most of the front and back gardens. I expect the house has changed a lot since my parents moved out in 1959! At that time, I was an undergraduate at Pembroke College, Cambridge; I ended my career as Professor of French Language Studies at Lancaster University.

Since 2004, I have had some interesting post-retirement occupations, and I am currently Chair of our Parish Council, which is the 3rd tier of local government in the City of Lancaster [county - city - parish]. With my French wife Françoise, we have been in the same house in Carnforth since 1987.

My very good wishes to you and to the church."

April Press Releases from CSW

The eyes of the Lord are on those who fear him, on those whose hope is in his unfailing love.

Psalm 33:18

Thank you so much for praying with us over Easter: as you may know, it's a dangerous time for many Christians around the world as their celebrations become a target. In India, the police interrupted a Good Friday service, dragging away the priests, nuns and families who had gathered. In Nigeria, Asso village in Kaduna state was attacked by Fulani militia as people gathered in churches for their Easter vigils. At least 12 people were killed and several others were injured. Please also pray for Nepal following an arson attack on a Catholic church on Tuesday after Easter, and thank God that no one was seriously injured.

Amazing answer to prayer! Finally, we're pleased to announce that we have been officially accredited by the UN! CSW's application for ECOSOC consultative status was approved on Wednesday, after eight years of deferral, many, many questions, and a lot of prayer. We're thrilled that this will allow us to promote freedom of religion or belief at the UN even more effectively, and we're so thankful for your faithful prayer and support. Please join us in thanking God for this wonderful news.

CSW's Chief Executive Mervyn Thomas said: "This is a significant day for CSW. UN accreditation will enable us to advance our work of promoting the right to freedom of religion or belief across the UN system. This vote is also a welcome acknowledgment of the importance of NGO contributions to the UN's work. CSW is deeply grateful to the UN member states who co-sponsored the resolution to grant us consultative status, and to the ECOSOC members who voted in support of our application. I would also like to express our gratitude to the UK Mission to the UN in New York for appealing our case after our application was rejected in February. We also thank the distinguished signatories of the joint letter urging ECOSOC to grant accreditation, and the five UN Special Rapporteurs for their strong letter in support of CSW."

Please continue to pray:

- Thanking God that nobody was seriously hurt in the attack on a church in Nepal on Tuesday, and that God would provide somewhere for the congregation to worship
- For God to comfort the congregation in India following the brutal interruption of their Good Friday service
- For God to protect and comfort the survivors of the attack in Nigeria and bring the perpetrators to justice
- Thanking God for the great news about the UN vote
- Please pray for the family of U No Ki, a lawyer and human rights campaigner who was assassinated in January. He was a dedicated advocate and his loss will be sorely felt
- Dumdaw Nawng Lat and Langjaw Gam Seng, Christians from the Kachin tribe, went missing just before Christmas after taking journalists to see a Catholic church that had been damaged in an airstrike.
- Pray for the Rohingya, an ethnic and religious minority in Burma that's one of the most persecuted people groups. At least 30,000 Rohingya have been forced to flee their homes and blocked access to aid.
- Please pray that more voices will speak up for freedom of religion, especially more Buddhist monks.
- Continue praying for a movement towards peace between Burma's ethnic groups and the government.
- Finally, please pray for Burma's constitution to be reformed, which is vital for all the changes we're praying for especially settlement for the ethnic groups.
